As founder and executive director of Empowerment Resources, Inc. (ERI), allow me to thank you for joining us at our 10th Annual Journey Into Womanhood<sup>TM</sup> Celebration and Awards Banquet. The young ladies participating in Journey Into Womanhood<sup>TM</sup> (JIW), ERI's signature program represent 10 years of our dedicated service to Jacksonville youth, thus the theme for today's program, Celebrate the "10"...Through the Years.

The concept of Empowerment Resources was born when I saw the need for gender relevant programming for at-risk girls in the Jacksonville community. A pilot "rites of passage" program for girls began in 2003, and this eventually became our flagship program, Journey Into Womanhood<sup>TM</sup> (JIW).

Over the years, we developed attributes that together are unique to our organization:

- One of the region's few gender-based rites of passage programs
- Programs that address the needs of the whole child-social, emotional, physical, intellectual, and spiritual
- A leadership development approach to positive change
- A focus on building core life skills that lead to self-sufficiency and self-empowerment
- Workshops and seminars offered where community members already congregate

We must be on the right path - the demand for our programs and services outpaces our capacity. There is a waiting list for Journey Into Womanhood  $^{\text{IM}}$ , and local schools, churches, and community groups constantly inquire about our parenting seminars and life skills workshops.

To date, JIW has graduated 26 girls from the program with 92% entering college! Because of your support, our two graduating seniors will be awarded scholarships to benefit them on their college journey. In addition to our seniors, all the ladies of JIW will demonstrate today what they have learned throughout the year. We're proud of them as well as the overall JIW accomplishments over the years.

Our ultimate goal as an organization is to become a whole-family system that supports the achievement of children and their parents. When the community's people reach their highest and best potential, the result is stronger neighborhoods and cities.

Over the past 10 years, Empowerment Resources has awarded more than \$10,000 in scholarships to OUR local girls. It's hard to believe that we started meeting a decade ago at a small church with just 20 girls. Our success wouldn't be possible without our dedicated family of parents, mentors, volunteers, sponsors, and presenters, who heed the call to offer their time, talent, and treasure to ERI. # Our History

Empowerment Resources Inc. (ERI) is a private 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, established in 2002. Our mission is to make children and their families stronger and empower them to become successful leaders in the community today, for a better tomorrow. We rely on volunteers to run the organization. Our signature programs include Journey Into Womanhood, Life Skills Workshops for teen boys and girls and Parenting Education Seminars and Coaching.

Journey Into Womanhood (JIW) began in 2003. This 25 week 'rites-of-passage' program for girls ages 9-17 focuses on their healthy transition from girl to young woman. It addresses the real issues youth are faced with today. A unique and inspiring program, JIW is facilitated by experienced leaders and volunteers, who help the participants cultivate their self-awareness, develop leadership skills and put them on the path to positively impact the communities in which they live. Participants engage in journal writing, community service projects, and enrichment trips.

The Journey Into Womanhood program focuses on gaining understanding of the twelve vital aspects of life:

Focuses on understanding the need to love oneself

#### Drugs and Alcohol

Focuses on preventing the effects of drug and alcohol abuse Focuses on learning healthy eating habits and selecting

## 2013-2014 Year in Review

#### September 2013: Parents Win the Old School V. New School Dance Off 4 Years in a Row!

Each year, parents are encouraged to attend at least one parent/youth workshop. JIW participants and their parents attended the kick off to the Jacksonville Jaguars Honor Rows Program, which featured a fitness workshop with Zumba instructors from Studio Jear Group Fitness and the return of the old school vs. new school dance off.

#### November 2013: 25 JIW Participants Earn a Ticket to a Jacksonville Jaguars Game.

The Jacksonville Jaguars Honor Rows program gives the girls an opportunity to attend a Jacksonville Jaguars home game. This unique, nationally recognized program uses seats at Jaguar home games as an incentive to encourage children and youth to set and achieve ambitious, but realistic goals. Youth must be between the ages of 9 and 17 to earn a seat to the game, and do not have to be A-B honor roll student to participate.

In order to attend the game, the girls had to complete several tasks including: participating in a Food and Nutrition workshop; pledging to remain alcohol, tobacco and drug free; set goals; and perform community service.

#### December 2013: JIWs Bring Joy to Nursing Home Residents in Annual Service Project.

The annual service project, led by JIW participants featured musical performances, dance, poetry and skits to bring holiday joy to the residents at JAX Rehab Nursing Home. All JIW participants are required and encouraged to give back to the community through volunteerism.

#### January 2014: Deyona Burton Recognized as a Tomorrow's Leader Award Recipient.

At the City of Jacksonville's 2014 Martin Luther King Jr. Breakfast, Deyona Burton, a 5th grade student and JIW participant, was recognized as one of six Tomorrow's Leaders award recipients for exemplifying the ideals and principles of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Deyona, a determined young woman with over 350 hours of volunteer experience spoke to the audience of over 2,500 people about her desire to grow up to be a great woman, a leader, and an achiever who makes life easier for others.

#### February 2014: IIWs Meet Inspiring Community Leaders.

JIW participants learned the value of civic and community leadership when they met the president of the Jacksonville chapter of the Buffalo Soldiers and Florida Senator Audrey Gibson. The Buffalo Soldiers overcame rejection and adversity to fight the wars ranging in the 1800s. Hot Wings, president of the Jacksonville chapter shared his journey to find his inner spirit to never give up. Additionally, JIW participants received an insider's perspective on how a bill becomes a law when Florida Senator Audrey Gibson visited the JIW Program. The participants were split into two groups to debate the merits of requiring school uniforms. After careful consideration, the JIW Senators concluded uniforms should be worn in school.

#### March 2013 - Career Readiness in Public Relations, Financial Advising and Videography

JIW girls received workforce preparation where they learned the good, bad, and ugly from four local women in business at the JIW Career Day. The day was a lesson on career preparation and entrepreneurship skills. This year's annual career exploration day also brought these four females to help the girls refine their messages for the E-Apprentice campaign as explained on page 5.

#### March 2014: JIWs Go to College!




